

George Washington Duff Home Site Brazosport Archaeological Society

The George Washington Duff home site is located on the west side of the Brazos River on the east side of Varner Creek adjacent to East Columbia. George W. Duff had arrived in Texas in 1852 at a young age. In 1858 he married Martha A. Culpepper, a cousin of the John Henry Dance family which arrived in Texas in1853. After serving in the Civil War he purchased 5 acres across Varner Creek from East Columbia. Duff and his wife would raise their family at this home while he continued to pursue the lawyer profession. The tract of land would be added to over the years but remained in control of the Duff family until it was given to the Cradle of Texas Conservancy in 1986. Only an underground cistern marks the home site amid a wooded area along Varner Creek.



Josiah H. Bell received 1½ leagues of land from the Mexican Government located on the west side of the Brazos River along Varner Creek on August 7, 1824. He moved to what was to become Brazoria County in January 1824 and made camp along Bell's Creek approximately two miles from its entrance into the San Bernard River. By the end of 1824 he established Bell's

Landing near the confluence of Varner Creek with the Brazos River. The Brazos River was completely navigable to this point and proved to be a good location for commercial trade. Though most of the old settlers of the area preferred the name "Bell's Landing", Squire Bell named the area located along the Brazos "Marion" (later East Columbia).




Josiah H. Bell 1 1/2 League Map 1879 The General Land Office of the State of Texas

Later at the end of a two mile lane from Bell's Landing to the prairie Josiah H. Bell laid out the town of Columbia, twenty square blocks eight lots to the block. Walter C. White and James Knight, local merchants under the style Walter C. White & Company, established their business in Columbia at an early date. Bell sold many of the town lots to Walter C. White.²

Josiah H. Bell sold 370 acres to Morgan, Claiborn, and Pendleton Rector in December 1836.³ This land was to the east of Varner Creek and bounded by the Brazos River. In 1844 the Rector brothers sold 45 acres on the lower part of Varner Creek to John Adriance.⁴ John Adriance, a long time business man and resident of East Columbia, sold George O. Jarvis half interest in several of his properties, including the 45 acres tract, February 1858.⁵

After arriving in Texas in 1852 at only 13 years of age not much is known of George W. Duff or who he studied law under. On June 24, 1858 George W. Duff and Martha (Mattie) A. E. Culpepper were married by B.D. Dashiell in what may have been a double ceremony as John A. Dance and Columbia Slade were wed by Dashiell the same day. The new Mrs. Duff was a cousin of John A. Dance and had arrived in Texas in 1853 with the John Henry Dance family and her Aunt Nancy Henry Culpepper when they established the Dance's plantation west of Columbia.⁶



Early Plat Map of East Columbia with no lots laid out east of Varner Creek⁷


The Dance brothers would open a machine shop on Front Street in East Columbia and build a home across Main Street from their shop. In the 1860 Census the Duff's are listed as part of the household of John H. Dance, Jr, with George W. Duff listed as a lawyer:

During the Civil War George W. Duff was mustered into service October 5, 1861 in Columbia as a 2nd Lt. in the "Columbia Blues", Company A, Brown's Regiment of Calvary assigned to guard the Texas coast first stationed at Quintana at the mouth of the Brazos River.⁸ Duff served all four years of the war. The Dance brothers put their skills and machine shop into service turning out the highly prized "Dance revolver" for the Confederacy. (Letters of correspondence during the Civil War between Mattie and George Duff are at the Confederate Research Center, Hill Junior College, Hillsboro, Texas).

After the Civil War several tracts on the east side of Varner Creek were purchased from John Adriance and George O. Jarvis by different individuals. George W. Duff purchased a five acre lot in April 1867 for \$611.45.9 There was nothing in the deed record indicating any improvements were on the property.



The 1870 the Federal Census lists the George W. Duff household:

Ten years later April 1877 John Adriance sold to George W. Duff a 2 ½ acre lot for \$150 adjacent to the lot "now occupied by said Duff". Duff purchased an additional 2 ½ acre lot Commented [SDP1]: James Smith communication: James says

O Commented [SDP1]: James Smith communication: James says Joseph F. Duff in the 1860 Census is Frederick J. Duff in the 1880 Census. adjacent to their original two lots April 1885 for \$35.00.11 Again there is no indication of any improvements on either 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ acre lot.

George W. and Mattie Duff would have eight children though all would not reach maturity. Several of their children married and raised families in the Columbia area (See Appendix A). The old West Columbia Cemetery holds the remains of many of the Duff family (See Appendix C).

With the Highway 35 and bridge construction across the Brazos River the original 5 acre lot was reduced in size to an acre more or less. In 1986 all 3 tracts were given to the Cradle of Texas Conservancy (See Appendix B).

An underground cistern is all the structural remains left visible from the George W. Duff home.
